This program is designed to support that goal.

Sustaining Excellence Through Exceptional Faculty

Professorships are critical to advancing our educational and research mission. They provide recognition for exceptional faculty, they serve as a "venture fund" to support new directions in research and education, and they represent enduring tributes to the donors who establish them. As we grow, we must increase investment in recruiting and retaining extraordinary faculty – those who help power our excellence. To that end, we seek private funding for ten new endowed professorships.

Leveraging a Legacy for Profound Impact

Under the Paul G. Allen Professorship Matching Gift Program, your gift will be matched 1:2 with earnings from the Paul G. Allen School Endowed Fund for Excellence – the endowment that Paul created when he established the Allen School. Funded at a combined philanthropic investment of \$1 million – the level currently established for Endowed Professorships in the Paul G. Allen School and the College of Engineering – each new professorship will bear the name you choose, as well as the name of Mr. Allen, the revered "idea man."
